

Trends in Pediatric Emergency Department Dental Visits: A Retrospective Review

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Introduction

The emergency department (ED) is becoming more popular among patients seeking hospital care for dental concerns. Dental care is one of the most unmet healthcare needs for children in the United States (US) and ED visits are increasing yearly for dental injury, pain, and infection.

Purpose

The purpose of this retrospective review was to evaluate trends in patients reporting to the ED for dental-related chief complaints at Cohen Children's Medical Center (CCMC) in Queens, New York.

Methods

Emergency room visits at a Level 1 Trauma Hospital in Queens, NY were evaluated regarding:

dental complaint

nature of follow-up

- age
- birth sex
- insurance
- Literature involving emergency room pediatric dental visits in various countries were reviewed and results were compared.

Results

23% of CCMC pediatric ED dental visits required emergent treatment. Trauma and tooth pain were the most common reasons for pediatric emergency dental visits.

Conclusion

This current review aligns with findings from multiple US studies comparing the types of dental emergencies, access to care, and types of dental trauma.

There is still a great need for preventive dental treatment, education for parents, and better access to care. In turn, this will reduce the ED burden, overuse of hospital resources and provide better patient care and overall experience.
