



Regional Initiatives in Dental Education (RIDE)

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# **BACKGROUND**

The objective of RIDE is to train dentists for leadership and dental practice in rural and underserved areas of the Pacific Northwest region. The program is based on UW School of Medicine WWAMI (Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana, and Idaho) program adapted for dentistry, and focuses on a super-generalist curriculum to best prepare dentists in rural settings. The RIDE program was funded in 2007 by the Washington State Legislature.

In 2012 RIDE graduated the first class of 8 dentists. As of 2021, RIDE has graduated 80 dentists, and the program continues to produce talented, service-oriented dental professionals and improve access to quality dental care, serving as a cost-effective model for rural dental education of the highest quality.

	Phase	Description							
	ECI (Seattle)	RIDE students come to Seattle for a week-long orientation, followed by a 4-week Early Clinical Immersion (ECI) course with the entire dental class.							
	1 <sup>st</sup> year (Spokane)	RIDE students spend their first year of dental school at the EWU Spokane campus, where UWSOD delivers high-fidelity dental education through in-person and advanced remote learning modalities.							
	RUOP	The summer after their first year, RIDE students spend 4 weeks rotating in the Rural and Underserved Opportunity Program (RUOP) at an affiliated community health center in Central or Eastern Washington.							
	2 <sup>nd</sup> and 3 <sup>rd</sup> year (Seattle)	Students spend their 2 <sup>nd</sup> and 3 <sup>rd</sup> years of dental school at the UWSOD in Seattle and benefit from our robust clerkship and comprehensive care clinical training models.							
	4 <sup>th</sup> Year (Seattle) + Extended Rotation	RIDE students spend their winter and spring quarters at an affiliated community health center in Central or Eastern Washington, refining their clinical and professional skills							







# **GAP ANALYSIS**

According to the 2016 WSDH Oral Health Workforce Report, 5% of dentists in Washington practice in a rural area, while 8.4% of the population lives in a rural area. Washington Counties with the fewest numbers of dentists per 100,000 population are located along the coast and in Eastern and Central Washington State.









#### **METHODS**


- Retrospective Descriptive Study

- De-identified existing database utilized for data collection & analysis
- Inclusion criteria: All graduates of the RIDE program (2012-2021)
- Exclusion criteria: Anyone not a graduate of the RIDE program













# **Home RIDE Provenance & Current Practice RUCA Designation**

#### CONCLUSION

- 1. Graduates of the RIDE program practice in rural areas in greater proportion compared to the general population of practicing dentists.
- 2. Statistical analysis demonstrated strong association:
  - Rural upbringing and choosing to practice in rural/underserved
- RIDE training sites (RUOP & SLR) and choosing to practice in rural/underserved area
- 3. RIDE graduates from study period tended to be male, Caucasian, and practice in HPSA site and/or rural region.
