What is a 'Pharmacy Residency'?

- ✓ Upon completion of a pharmacy degree, graduates can pursue further training with a clinical focus, known as a residency programs.
- ✓ Residency training is divided into two postgraduate years:
 - ✓ Postgraduate year one (PGY-1) offers more generalized training, providing residents exposure to a broad range of clinical scenarios.
 - ✓ Postgraduate year two (PGY-2) emphasizes a specific area of interest and helps lead to specialization in that field. In order to complete a PGY-2 residency, a PGY-1 program must be completed.





The Competency Areas are evaluated through different learning experiences, occurring over the training year. [See Figure B]


- Orientation occurs over the first 4 weeks of the training year.
- Patient Care, Population Health, Academia, and Research learning experiences occur over the full 12-months of training.








Clinical Pharmacy Resident Activities
